Looking back over our 2013-2014 season, I am thrilled to report that our plays have been extremely well-received. We have attracted new directors and our audience numbers are growing. Our most recent play, "**Welfarewell**," written by Canadian playwright Cat Delaney, received a glowing review and drew over 900 people.

We have more exciting news. **Next season, due to popular demand, our evening shows will start at 7:30 p.m.** More than two thirds of our audience asked for an earlier start and we are happy to comply. This will make it easier for our older patrons to come to our shows. So please note our evening shows beginning in October this year will start at 7:30 p.m. Our matinees will remain at 2 p.m.



We are also offering a new approach to our Season Ticket subscription. From now on, patrons will be able to choose between a three play Season Subscription, excluding the Panto, or a four play Season Subscription that includes the Panto. The two types of subscriptions will be priced accordingly.

Our new 2014-15 season of plays has been announced and it looks exciting! In early October, our first play will be "Steel Magnolias," a well-known and much-loved drama. This will be followed by a fabulous new version of Snow White as our Panto at Christmas, entitled "Snow White and the Magnificent Seven Dwarfs." Set in the wild west and complete with cowboys and a medicine man, this Panto offers a new twist on an old theme. In March 2015, we will present the gripping thriller "Victoria's House" and in May we will be performing the fast-paced and hilariously funny "Barely Heirs." I know you will enjoy them all.

Many members will be familiar with Tony Gilsenan's set designs for St Luke's Players over the past 10 years or so. He created and was also been involved in building them.

Last year, Tony relocated to Cambridge, England to live closer to his daughter and grandson.

Although he will miss working with the set building crew at St Luke's Players, Tony offered to design the set for "Prepare To Meet thy Tomb" from across the Atlantic, and director Jon Scheer immediately took him up on the offer.

The set design was developed with Tony's daughter scanning early drafts and emailing them to Jon from England,

followed up by Skype calls with Tony to discuss modifications. The final plans arrived by regular mail a few days before set construction was due to start. As with many set designs, minor changes are sometimes needed, but having worked with Tony for so long, it was easy to adapt his scale drawings.

In a recent email from Tony, he noted: "Glad to know that all is going well and that you were able to adjust things from the drawings to suit the needs. It is so hard at this distance to cover all the probables! Nonetheless I enjoy knowing that it is on track and wish you another great success. My only sorrow is that I will not be there to see the polished performances."

Certainly Tony's cheerful and experienced presence is missed during set construction, but the next best thing is to work with his designs and know that he is only an email or Skype call away! Hopefully, Tony will be able to design sets for St Luke's Players for many years to come!

Well, what we did was gather a talented cast and crew and offer a very funny but bittersweet play called Welfarewell and we made it to Spring! St. Luke's Players third offering for this season turned out to be a great success. Audiences were pleased and left the theatre in good spirit, commenting all the way. I heard comments about the sets, the costumes, the performances and the story. We also landed in third spot for largest number of patrons in seats!

When I took on the job of directing Welfarewell, I knew I did not want the audience to be particularly comfortable. The subject matter, although presented with humour, is not comfortable. When I talked to Lisa Preston, the set designer, she ran with my thoughts and with Neville, Dave and crew, created one of my favourites sets I have ever worked with. The grey

and minimalist backdrop was perfect for all the scenes that moved around the stage. "Grey, it's a universal colour. You'll see." (Esmerelda) It certainly was universally grey and it worked!

Our stage hands and ASM choreographed the scene changes into a ballet that worked so well they were hardly noticed even thought the set pieces made a lot of noise.

The actors that I cast in all the roles were perfect! I was so pleased that I cannot single anyone out. I will mention Jane Guy and Paul Gillan. Jane, as Esmerelda, had some of the most complicated lines and long speeches and was in every scene but one. Paul Gillan took on the role of Alfred David, the lawyer, after having only had two previous walk-on roles with no lines. I am so proud of the work he did. Congratulations to all of the cast of Welfarewell. You all worked hard and deserve the accolades!

All in all, Welfarewell was a success from start to finish.

Next season you will have to eat earlier. The shows will start at 7:30 p.m.

At our last show, Welfarewell, 475 audience members were kind enough to fill in a survey form to help better understand those who plonk down your hard earned dollars to sit through an evening of St. Lukes Players.

Seems like people are getting older! Compared to our last survey, there has been a 3% shift to the older age group with 90% over the age of of 50 and 75% over 65.

About half of our audience go to other theatres like Langham Court and The Belfry where they prefer to watch mostly Comedies and Murder Mysteries.

They are very loyal to SLP as 63% watch three or four of our shows every year.

In this age of electronic media it was nice to see that most learn about our shows from family and friends followed by the Times Colonist and our brochures. A surprisingly small number used the Internet to find out about us.

And only a quarter of those surveyed wanted on line ticketing.

A large majority would welcome an earlier start to our shows and the Board have responded quickly with a decision to move to a 7:30 p.m. start next season.

A quarter (25%) of our season ticket holders said they would like to be able to choose to have season tickets for only three shows (by excluding the panto). The board has also responded to this and an option for three shows will be included in our brochure for next season.

And then there were the comments and suggestions for improvements ranging from the impossible (could we have an escalator to get me up from the car park) to the possible (herbal tea at the concession).

It was very heartening to read all of the congratulations which applauded SLP for the job we do in providing plays which the audience enjoys in an environment they find pleasant and welcoming.

A number of people did mention less than comfortable seating, some requested more cushions. One suggested a sloping auditorium. Alas there is not much we can do to help in the short term – we are looking for better seats, there is no storage space for more cushions and sloping the floor would create interesting challenges for dancing classes and Church pub nights.


We had many suggestions for plays – mostly comedies and classics – like those by Norm Foster, Alan Ayckbourn and classics by Noel Coward, Oscar Wilde and Agatha Christie. The Board will try and include at least one of the suggestions in the 2015-16 season and more beyond that.

So finally a big thanks to all who filled in the survey forms. We really do want to respond to our audience and provide the kind of theatre they enjoy.
