

Welcome to the old-fashioned parlour of 909 Sycamore Street, a boarding house for ancient females. The six residents - presumed sweet little old ladies until they prove otherwise - have a unique solution to the problem of getting that handsome homicide detective, Dennis O'Finn, to pay them a visit. You'll find that a nice genteel homicide, with a cup of tea as the murder weapon, is all it takes. However, when Detective O'Finn discovers he's the motive for this murder, and he decides to distance himself from the ladies, what are the sweet dears to do?

Directed by **Michael King**, rehearsals are progressing nicely with actors off-book already. With six juicy parts of "old ladies" in the offing, dozens of senior female actors in the Victoria area came out for auditions, making the casting quite a challenge. The ladies, each with their own quirks and personalities, are played by **De Roger**, **Madeleine Mills**, **Pippa Catling**, **Joy Farrell**, **Deb Taylor** and **Julie Gray.** The cast is rounded out with **Paul Gillan** in the role of Detective O'Finn, the cause of all this mayhem and his side kick Kramer, played by **Chris**

Baddock. Finding strong able-bodied men who are called upon to remove the dead bodies proved difficult until **Paul Hawkes-Frost** and **Carl Powell** stepped up. The finger print expert Johnson is played by **Beverly van Druten-Blais** and the conniving reporter, Jane Rogers, is played by **Heather Lee**. The Stage Manager for this hilarious show is **Jon Scheer**.



CLIFFHANGER

I'm a firm believer of theatre magic. Seeing the finished production, after months of preparation, hard work and creative angst, reaffirms my belief over and over again. It is extremely satisfying to be a part of a successful show and, according to the number of tickets sold, *Cliffhanger* certainly earned that claim. Yes, there were challenges – there are always challenges – but what brings a theatre company together is the ability to work through them.

We were challenged with the use of a scrim on our set. Luckily Dallas Ashby and Carol-Anne Moore were able to make it work. Judging by the oohs and aahs from the audiences, it proved to be one of the many surprises we had during the show.

Another challenge was the theatrical blood used on our actors. We needed a formula that would be effective, non-staining and easy to clean. With a recipe found on the internet, Natalie Munro concocted a rather large jar of this crimson liquid that created quite a stir when the character of the maniacal Melvin came out in the last scene covered in it. We also overcame the challenge of keeping our actors unharmed during falls and blows. It is important to make sure that we can make action scenes look believable but in a safe environment for our actors who volunteer their time and talents for our shows. Tristan Bacon, from workingclasstheatre, came in one evening to show us how to properly interact during physical stunt work.

Our biggest challenge, from a technical point of view, was examining the use of different spaces in the back of the hall for the Stage Manager, lighting techs and sound operators. The Executive has discussed renovating the back storage room into a tech booth. This would provide a secure area for our equipment and eliminate any disturbances for our patrons that happen when Stage Managers attempt to quietly call the show from the back of the hall.

As St. Luke's Players continue to bring quality theatre entertainment to their audiences, I'm sure there will be many more laughs and surprises for years to come.


