## **SLEEPING BEAUTY THE PANTO**






#### Seen and Heard!

The emphasis was on practical aspects as applied to St. Luke's Players' equipment and arrangements in the hall. They were very much hands-on, as an example the participants had to patch the various speakers and to change the back stage mixer.

All together about 25 people came along, some suffered through both workshops!

# ANATOMY OF A HAT submitted by Susan Ellis, costume designer for Sherlock Holmes....

For the St. Luke's Players' upcoming production of Sherlock Holmes and the Spinsters of Blackmead we wanted to present Holmes' classic look, with the caped overcoat, the deerstalker hat, pipe and magnifying glass. We could not source a deerstalker hat larger than child-size, so I had to make one.

 I started with a nice tweed hat made of Irish wool from a thrift store.



2. Even this hat was too small, so I removed the inside and outside hat bands and cut the sides. I also cut off the brim along the two sides, leaving just the front and back brims. I really wanted to use the beautiful feather, but in the end there was nowhere on the hat to put it.



3. I then sewed the extra brim pieces to the front and back brims to make them longer.



4. Then I made a pattern of the longer brims and cut out four pieces of fabric to cover them. We wanted the hat to complement the brown tweed overcoat, so I used a brown herringbone patterned scarf, also from a thrift store.



6. After adding the flaps, hand sewing everything down securely around the crown, sewing the original inside hatband back on and tying up the flaps, the hat is done!



Next, I sewed the fabric pieces together and then onto the brims themselves. The crown of the hat was covered by six triangles of the herringbone sewn together to make a dome shape. This was sewn onto the hat by hand along the six seams in order to secure the crown. I also cut out two ear flaps and lined them, adding ties.

### ST LUKE'S PLAYERS: A BRIEF HISTORY submitted by Neville Owen

In 1949 a group led by Mrs. Flora (Nicky) Nicholson began life as the Doncaster Players. The following year they accepted the invitation of Canon Pike (see his photo in the lobby) and moved up the road to St. Luke's Church Hall. They became known as St. Luke's Players. We have been here ever since, putting on at least two plays every year, and in one year, ten. Over the years hundreds have trodden the boards at St. Luke's and many more have done back-stage work, all volunteers—no one gets paid.

Then as now some of the members of the Players are also members of St. Luke's Church.

From its earliest days, the objective of the Players has been to produce 'good, clean plays for your enjoyment' subject to the Rector's approval. The very first production was Our Hearts Are Young and Gay by Cornelia Otis Skinner. To celebrate our 40th anniversary in 1989 we presented A Fate Worse Than Death written by the Players' Betty Jeanpierre. In 2006, a pantomime, Aladdin was introduced by Helena and Dave Hitchcock. One has been performed every year since. Our Pantos are extremely popular. In 2008, Sleeping Beauty was completely sold out before the first performance. This sell out trend has continued for the past 10 years!

In the early days, plays ran for only one or two nights. Later it became standard to run from Thursday to Saturday. We then extended to four nights. In 1989, the leap was made to a split run of Wednesday to Saturday on two successive weeks for 8 performances.

In 1997, a Saturday matinee was added for those who could not venture out at night. In 2006 a Preview night was added This is free of charge to crew, family, friends of the cast and various organizations. In 2010, Sunday matinees were added. Now, in addition to the Preview, we regularly present 12 performances for each play, 13 for the Panto.

Several years ago, Season Tickets were offered. This year we sold 400. This growth is due in part to seat reservations being offered to Season Ticket holders but perhaps because in 2015, we went to a 7:30 pm opening.

In 2003, a website was established giving the latest information, including auditions, performance dates and a listing of all past productions complete with photographs. Recently we went to on-line ticket sales. This has proved to be popular.

Now to money: over the years, St. Luke's Players has contributed to the Church in lieu of rent.

It's amounted to \$200 000 over the past dozen years. Of course, it hasn't always been easy. One year two members had to loan \$\$ to the Players so that we could present a play. Another year an arrangement had to be made for the Treasurer to pay back "borrowed" funds. We are pleased that our concession prices, set 10 years ago have remained inexpensive, and we still make a small profit.

In addition, the Players have upgraded the stage and hall facilities with new lights, improved sound

equipment, stage curtains window curtains, dimmer over-head lights, and 'comfortable' chairs. Let's not forget the cushions! We were also pleased to make a contribution towards a new hall roof.

We very much appreciate the support, cooperation and assistance provided by St. Luke's Church. This year marks the 70th anniversary of the Players. We look forward to the next 70 years!
