My personal thanks to a great cast and crew, so many good people that it is impossible to pick out anyone in particular. However I should mention Sharon Sutherland, the Producer, and Bronwyn Taylor, the Stage Manager, who contributed so much effort. For two of the cast it was their first time on stage, but I'm sure it won't be their last!

Other cast members include: Elaine Lewis, Jesse Setka, Brenda Bowcott, Robert Knudson, Patrick Alexander, Neville Owen, Timothy Coon and Andrew Sutherland.

In this superlative mystery/comedy, eight guests who have never met each other or their apparently absent host and hostess, are lured to an island off the coast of Devon and marooned. Statuettes of little soldier boys on the mantel fall to the floor and break one by one, as those in the house succumb to a diabolical avenger. A nursery rhyme tells how each of the ten "soldiers" met his death until there were none. A mysterious voice accuses each of having got away with murder and then one drops dead - poisoned. One down and nine to go!

This popular Agatha Christie classic will be presented at St Luke's Hall (3821 Cedar Hill X Road) at the following performances:

June 4 - 7 & 11 - 14 at 8.00 pm, and June 7 at 2.00 pm.

So how much do you know about Agatha Christie? Frank McGilly did some research not long ago and came up with the following interesting information:

- Her 66 mystery novels (plus numerous collections of short stories) made her <u>the</u> best-selling novelist of all time.
 During her lifetime and even after, year after year, her books outsold all others in English except the Bible. An estimated one *billion* copies have been sold in English. She has been translated into over 100 languages.
 Astonishingly, she is the all-time best-selling author in France, with over 40 million copies sold 31 years after her death her books are still best sellers.
- Besides mysteries, she wrote approximately 40 other novels, six using the pen name 'Mary Westmacott'.
- She is credited with 23 plays written by her or adapted by others from her stories.
- Her play, *The Mousetrap*, has run in London for over 20,000 consecutive performances, a phenomenon without parallel. (Nearest known competitor: *A Perfect Murder*, about 8000 performances, in New York.)
- In 1955, her Witness for the Prosecution was judged Best Foreign Play of the year by the New York Drama Critics Circle. The Hollywood version was nominated for six Academy Awards in 1957, including Best Picture (The Bridge on the River Kwai took the Oscar).
- About 100 movies have been based on her writings; a precise count is difficult, because (1) they keep coming and (2) dozens have been made for television, and may be separately listed.
- Her two best-known characters, Miss Marple and Hercule Poirot, still appear regularly in TV series that are among the most popular in the medium.

In 1955, her success had reached such proportions that she became, in effect, a corporation, Agatha Christie Limited, created to manage the world-wide distribution of her works.

The stream of mystery novels began in 1920 with *The Affair at Styles*, in which Hercule Poirot made his first appearance; thereafter, for over fifty years, hardly a year went by without one or two new Agatha Christies. Her first big best seller was *The Murder of Roger Ackroyd*, in 1926. *Postern of Fate*, the last novel she wrote, appeared in 1975, the year before her death. But death did not stem the flow. Two novels written earlier were published after her death, and new collections of short stories continued to appear well into the 1990s. No wonder a corporation was required to manage such assets!

Despite the fame that accompanied such success, Agatha Christie succeeded throughout her life in guarding her privacy, with one notable lapse. Born in 1890, she had a conventional upper-middle-class upbringing, including finishing school in France. Along the way, she became an accomplished pianist.

In 1914 she married Archibald Christie, an artillery officer, breaking an earlier engagement. During World War 1, Agatha worked in military hospitals, and is said to have learned a good deal about poisons, knowledge that she put to good use.

The Christies had one daughter, but by 1926 the marriage had deteriorated; her husband bluntly asked for a divorce, his affections having strayed. Also in 1926, her mother died. In December, Agatha disappeared for ten days, taking the family car. She was eventually found registered at a hotel, under the name - a nice touch -- of the Other Woman. While there she had not exactly hidden herself; she even played the piano with the hotel orchestra. Since she was now a celebrity, the press feasted on the story. Was it a nervous breakdown, as her doctors suggested? Was Agatha poking an angry thumb in her husband's wandering eye? Many suspected a publicity stunt. (If so, it was a flop; the publicity was unfavorable, and humiliating for her.) In the course of this, Colonel Christie concisely exposed his scale of values: 'I would give five hundred pounds to know the whereabouts of my wife.' In Agatha's autobiography, there is not one word about this escapade.

Whatever Agatha's mental state in 1926, by 1930 she had recovered sufficiently to marry the (much younger) archaeologist Sir Max Mallowan. Their travels in the Middle East contributed background to such later novels as *Murder on the Nile*. Their marriage was happy in the early years, and endured despite Mallowan's affairs in later life. Agatha evidently was better at choosing plot lines than husbands, although she once said 'An archaeologist is the best husband any woman can have; the older she gets, the more interested he is in her.'

In 1971, Agatha Christie was named a Dame of the British Empire. She died in 1976, but lives on vigorously in print, on the screen, and - as now at St Luke's Players -- on stage.

"THE HEIRESS"

"The Heiress" is based on the novel "Washington Square" by Henry James. Dr Austin Roper, a rich widower, lives in Washington Square, New York in 1850 with his only surviving child Catherine, a sweet-natured, but physically plain young woman. Catherine is swept off her feet by the charming Morris Townsend. Dr. Sloper strongly disapproves, believing him to be after Catherine's money alone, and threatens to cut off her inheritance. Morris breaks off the relationship because of this. After Dr. Sloper dies, Townsend comes back in her life. However, now Catherine has learned how to deal with him.

The cast comprises 6 women (ages 20's to 60's) and 3 men (ages 20's to 60's). Tony Gilsenan's talents have, once again, been sought by Langham Court and he has designed the set for the upcoming production of "The Cemetery Club".
