President's Message

Our 2016-17 Season kicked off with record numbers attending *A Murder is Announced*, an Agatha Christie favourite, largely due to the enthusiastic promotion of the show by first-time director Peter Gatt.

More people sought tickets at the door for the panto than in previous years, so we were able to boost our sales to compensate for 'no shows'. The only day we had to turn away ticket-seekers was the final performance. Many who purchased tickets for prior performances were sick so asked to use their tickets on January 2, resulting in considerable over-subscription for that show. We honoured all previously purchased tickets.

Auditions for *Duets* (March) and *The Robin Hood Caper* (May) were held in January. With so many talented people auditioning, the directors had difficult decisions to make. The shows are cast and rehearsals for *Duets* have begun. *The Robin Hood Caper* rehearsals will commence as soon as *Duets* finishes, unless the directors wish to rehearse elsewhere in advance. Tickets for both shows are available on-line through EventBrite and will go on sale at The Papery February 8, so make sure not to miss these great productions!

The church always asks the Players if we are willing/able to provide entertainment for their Pub Nights. The one following this newsletter is

in early June. More information will follow in our next newsletter, so in the meantime, think of what you personally, or we as a group, could offer by way of entertainment.

Aladdin

It seems a long time since the Christmas panto but the memories are vivid. As usual, Directors, **Merry Hallsor** and **Dave Hitchcock** hosted a kick off meeting in the spring. We brainstormed ways to get a good turnout at the auditions; **Jean de Cartier** talked about her vision for the costumes and Anne Swannell gave us a sneak peek at the set design. During the summer, posters went up and a flurry of notes invited current and past actors and volunteers to audition and help backstage. It paid off. The auditions were well attended and a very talented cast and crew got together for a Meet and Greet pot luck and read through in late September.

Once again, singing and choreography rehearsals started in October in space rented from the Church of the Cross kitty-corner to St Luke's Church. This year, the Musical Director was **Connie te Kampe** and the Choreographer was **Lia Collis**. As soon as the fall production finished, we migrated back to our "home away from home" at St Luke's Church and started blocking rehearsals on the stage.

Reading though last year's retrospective, we encountered many of the same challenges; some cast members had other commitments and couldn't attend rehearsals - although that did give Dave free rein to practice many different voices - and, despite liberal application of hand sanitizer, the "panto cold" struck once again with lost voices and general misery for both cast and crew. On a more positive note, many of the villagers' parents volunteered their time to the panto this year. Some had never done any theatre work before but were very willing to learn. An added bonus was getting to know the children through their parents' eyes.

Ticket sales were brisk with our villain, **Mike Chadwick**, booed in true

panto fashion by patrons standing in line waiting for tickets outside *The Papery*. In the past, we have always had empty seats at performances so this year, when people contacted us when they couldn't get tickets, we suggested that they may be able to purchase tickets at the door. This worked well until the last performance when so many people arrived without tickets that we unfortunately couldn't squeeze them all into the auditorium.

A tradition which we have for all shows is the strike of the set and general cleanup which occurs within a couple of days of the last performance. Everything is ripped apart ready to construct the set for the next show. The costume people put away costumes, props retrieve the borrowed props for return and store the rest away, and volunteers clean the dressing rooms and the sitting area downstairs. The cast and crew are encouraged to come and help alongside the volunteers who put the set together in the first place. This year, there was a record number of helpers with cast, crew, parents and other volunteers getting everything apart so quickly it was done before we got the kettle on for a tea break. Looking at the empty stage when everyone had gone home brought a lump to a few throats - everything was quiet where just the previous day, it was lights, music and action - and we left the hall wondering what we used to do before the annual panto had taken over our lives.
