BEAUTIFUL NATURE BREAK



Victoria's verdant grasslands had been cultivated and maintained by the Coast Salish ancestors of the Songhees First Nation (Lekwungen) for centuries. They worked hard to encourage the growth of camas, their staple root crop, and other edible native plants. Common camas bulbs were considered a delicacy. Bulbs would be steamed, or pit cooked for one to three days to break down the complex carbohydrates into fructose. The cooked bulbs would then be ground into a meal which was used in variety of ways. Sometimes it would be mixed with water and the batter cooked like a pancake, or the meal was mixed with water, formed into bricks, cooked, and stored.

talented set-building crew for adding a wonderful, authentic touch to this "drawing room" murder mystery.


Max Terpstra's lighting gave an eerie, enigmatic shine to the set, heightening the drama and suspense.






